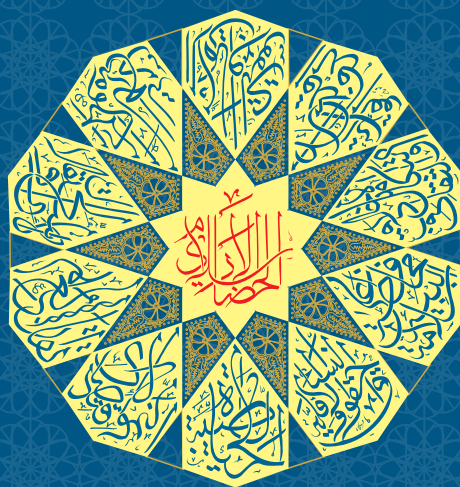

IAIS Malaysia's Online Discussion Series continued on 14 May with "Kesan PKP Terhadap Kontrak Pekerjaan dan Perbankan di Malaysia" (Impact of the MCO on Work and Banking Contracts in Malaysia). The session was moderated by Dr Mohamed Azam Mohamed Adil (Deputy CEO, IAIS Malaysia), and featured as presenters Syamsul Rijal Jamil (consultant, SMC Consulting Asia) and Mrs Apnizan Abdullah (Research Fellow, IAIS Malaysia). The topic was chosen due to uncertainty surrounding various matters raised by the Movement Control Order (MCO) issued by the government to curb the spread of COVID-19. The main focus of the MCO, which started on 18 March 2020, has been to limit interaction between people; schools and universities have been closed and people ordered to work from home (except for selected essential services) and limit their daily routines (such as grocery shopping, eating outside, etc.). The second presenter, Mrs Apnizan, deliberated in-depth on how banking institutions should respond to the situation in terms of their banking contracts. She highlighted the issue of whether or not the public should opt for the moratorium offered by banks. The discussion ended with a question and answer session.
